Leadership

During the months of September and October many of our churches and schools will celebrate harvest and Creationtide. We give thanks that what has been sown and nurtured earlier in the year has also been gathered and shared. Harvest thanksgiving is part of a deeper rhythm of sowing and reaping, of growing and gathering.

Jesus used this same rhythm in growing his disciples. He sent them out to heal and to proclaim God's kingdom. But they then returned to Jesus to give thanks for all that they had seen and done. It was through this rhythm of going and returning, sending and gathering, doing and reflecting, that Jesus enabled the disciples to learn from him and from each other.

This pattern of action and reflection is at the heart of the different learning networks we are seeking to nurture in the life of the diocese. There is much collective wisdom to draw on from across the many different dimensions of our diocesan life, from children's ministry to social action, from evangelism to caring for creation and so on. By creating opportunities, both locally and more widely, to share together, we can see more clearly what God is growing, encourage one another, and learn afresh to recognise the call of Jesus in our daily lives.

Thrive: Multi-parish benefices that work

The House of the Open Door, Childswickham House,
Childswickham, Worcestershire

Thrive is a two-year programme of development and growth, especially designed for multi-parish benefices.

Each group must include the incumbent, plus four to six leaders - lay or ordained - with significant influence in the life of the benefice. Obviously, attendees will need to be open to the possibilities of change, and keen to work to see the mission of their churches grow. The example of the incumbent in this process will be key to its success.

Upon their return from the Thrive community gatherings, this thrive group will then work with others in the benefice to decide the future shape of ministry and mission across the churches.

Participants commit to four non-residential Thrive communities of two full days each, (usually a Friday and a Saturday, over the course of two years, plus one final day for review and commissioning). At the end of each gathering, each team puts together an action plan for the next six months to facilitate change. Interested? Email lbird@glosdioc.org.uk
